
GEORGE A. KUCHEL, M.D., TO SPEAK AT FALL PREVIEW MEETING

George A. Kuchel, M.D., director of the UConn Center on Aging and Chief of the Division of Geriatric Medicine, will deliver the keynote address at ALP's Fall Preview Meeting at Seabury. His topic will be *Live Long and Prosper*; Our Common Path from Nihilism and Hype Towards Hope and Realism

The meeting will take place on September 15, 2010, from 9:30 am to noon, at Heritage Hall at Seabury; in addition to Dr. Kuchel's address, the meeting will feature previews of fall seminars, and descriptions of single sessions and trips

Dr. George Kuchel also holds the Citicorp Chair in Geriatrics and Gerontology at the University of Connecticut. He serves on the Duncaster Board of Directors.

He received his M.D. from McGill University, trained in internal medicine at Montreal General Hospital and geriatric medicine at the Harvard Medical School.

Before joining UConn, Dr.Kuchel was Director of the Division of Geriatric Medicine at McGill University Health Center. He has published over 100 scientific papers including many on the influence of aging on the physiology of bladder control.

FS-1. FUTURE OF THE NEWS

Kiki Eglinton, Coordinator, Wednesdays, Sept. 22, 29. 10 am-noon.



These sessions, panel discussions facilitated by Don Noel, will continue our focus on the news media-who reports the news, how. and through what venues; whether print media will survive; and the future of news in Hartford.

FS-2, OPERA

Glenda Garlo, Coordinator, Fridays, Sept. 24; Oct. 1, 8, 15, 22, 29. 9:30 am-12 noon.

Class members will present Glinka's A Life for the Tsar, Meyerbeer's Les Huguenots, Massenet's Thais, Wagner's Lohengrin, and Rossini's La Cenerentola, and look at the Bluebeard story in works by Bartok and Offenbach. Maximum class size, 30.

FS-3. SHORT STORIES

Carol Matzke, Coordinator. Mondays, Sept. 27; Oct. 25; Nov. 29. 10 am-noon.

Discussion of two short stories at each session, chosen in advance by a volunteer member of the group; Participants will also learn about the authors of the stories.

FS-4. JUSTICE—WHAT IS THE RIGHT THING TO DO?

Bill Olds and Ivan Backer, Presenters. Tuesdays, Sept. 28; Oct. 5, 12, 19, 26; Nov. 2. 10 am-noon.

A series of 12 lectures, given over six weeks, by Harvard Professor Michael Sandel, will help viewers become more critically minded thinkers about moral decisions we face. These lectures explore key moral and political issues by challenging our beliefs and ideas about what is right and wrong. Sandel does this by probing questions and what if scenarios posed to 1,000 Harvard students. Harvard University in partnership with WGBH Public TV makes the course available to the public. Following the lectures we will have discussions, led alternately by Bill Olds and Ivan Backer.

FS-5. FINANCIAL PLANNING FOR ELDERS

Valerie Thomas, CLU, ChFC, and Atty. Elysa Graber Lipperman, Presenters. Wednesdays, Sept. 29; Oct. 6. 1-3 pm.

The presenters will discuss financial issues affecting elders and their families, such as preserving our hardearned money from taxes and the cost of long-term care. Unique estate planning ideas will be discussed, as well as the positioning of investments in the volatile economic environment.

FS-6. THE HOLOCAUST

Ivan Backer, coordinator. Mondays, Oct. 4, 11, 18. 1:15-2:45 pm.

This seminar consists of three lectures. The first will feature Dr. Avinoam Patt, Director, Maurice Greenberg Center for Judaic Studies, University of Hartford, who will deal with the historical background, causes, and extent of the Holocaust; the second, by Rabbi Philip Lazowski, will deal with his own experiences as a survivor; and the third, by Ivan Backer, will describe the escape of his family from occupied Czechoslovakia.

FS-7. WRITING YOUR MEMOIRS

Leta Marks, Presenter. Tuesdays, Oct. 5, 12, 19, 26. 1-3 pm.

Write and share your stories with a friendly writers' group. Each week we write short memoirs, bring them to the group to read, and delight in hearing one another. FS-8. THE DARWINIAN REVOLUTION



Jim Yaeger, Coordinator. Wednesdays October 6, 13, 20, 27; Nov.3, 10. 10 am-noon. At Duncaster

This is a year-long course consisting of 24 DVD lectures by Professor Frederick Gregory of the University of Florida. The lectures introduce the

remarkable story of Darwin's ideas, how scientists and religious leaders reacted to them, and the sea change of human thought that resulted. In the fall we will listen to the first 12 half-hour lectures in six two-hour sessions. Following each lecture there will be discussion led by ALP member Jim Yaeger, a retired Professor of Anatomy from the University of Connecticut Health Center.

FS-9. MOVIE BUFFS

Jim Hanley, Presenter. Thursdays, Oct. 7; Nov. 4; Dec. 2, 10:30 am-noon.

Participants view films at Cinestudio on the campus of Trinity College or elsewhere, at a time of their choosing, and then discuss them in class at Seabury with the knowledgeable director of Cinestudio.

FS-10. CURRENT EVENTS

Brigitte Schulz, Presenter. Wednesdays, Oct. 13, 20, 27; Nov. 3, 10. 1-3 pm.

The presenter, a political science professor at Trinity College, will be back to facilitate and lead an international current events discussion group. Participants are encouraged to follow international news in The New York Times to provide a common basis for discussion, and to feel free to supplement this with any other sources of their choosing.

FS-11. CREATIVE WRITING

Dorothy Sterpka, Presenter. Mondays, November 1, 8, 15, 22, 29, 1-3 pm.

This course, led by Dorothy Sterpka, a professor of writing at Central Connecticut State University, will focus on continuing to hone our writing skills in different modes — memoirs, fiction, poetry—by reading the works of others and by sharing the writings of each participant, followed by discussion of what has been read.

FS-12. WHAT MAKES A MASTERPIECE

Hennie Stargardter and Myra Panitch, Presenters. Tuesdays, Nov, 2, 9, 16, 1-3 pm. 1-3 pm.

Explore ideas and techniques —shape, color, line—of artists through the ages, with focus on the Renaissance in Session 1 and the Impressionists in Session 2. During the first hour of each session you will create your own work after instructions by the leaders. In the second hour you will view slides and reproductions of related art work. The classes will be coordinated with a visit to the Wadsworth Atheneum (admission fee, \$7) in the third class meeting.

FS-13. THE PLAY'S THE THING

Nancy Kramer, Facilitator. Thursdays, Nov. 4, 11; Dec. 2, 9, 1-3 pm.



Continuing this popular seminar, Nancy will lead participants in reading plays aloud, and discussing the lives of the authors and the ideas in the plays.

FS-14 THE ARTS AND CRAFTS MOVEMENT

Ruthanne Hartzheim, Presenter. Fridays, November 5, 12, 19, 9:30 am-noon.

The Arts and Crafts Movement initially developed in England during the latter half of the 19th century. Subsequently this style was taken up by American designers, such as Frank Lloyd Wright, G. Stickley, and E. Hubbard.. We will examine this development through videos and discussion.

FS-15 ALPERS' TRAVELS

Helen Lansberg, Coordinator. Mondays, November 8, 22; Dec. 6, 10 am-noon; Dec. 13, 1-3 pm.

This series consists of four travel descriptions: David Buddington will describe a trip to France, with visits to Sarlat-la-Canéda, Bordeaux, and Paris, as well as a hiking trip along the Chemin St. Jacques; Peter Cruikshank will present a tape covering a Trans-Siberian Railroad trip from Moscow to Beijing, supplemented by pictures of a trip from Moscow to Vladivostok; Frank Shoring will describe 25 awesome and 25 awful travel sites; and Dick Carlson will describe a trip to the Amazon.

FS-16. LESSONS FROM THE CLIMATE WARS; PAST CONTROVERSIES AND FUTURE PROSPECTS

FALL 2010 SINGLE SESSIONS

FSS-1. TOUR, OLD STATE HOUSE

Tour Leader, Sally Whipple, Director of Education and Community Programming, Old State House. Wednesday, September 22. 1-3 pm.

Our program will include a full tour of the building and a special presentation on Prudence Crandall, including a 22-minute video describing her experiences and their effect on the Connecticut Black Law, which outlawed the teaching of out-of-state African Americans in Connecticut. This will be followed by a discussion of Prudence Crandall, led by a knowledgeable person playing her part. There is a \$5.00 admission fee.

FSS-2. THE PROBATE COURT SYSTEM

Presenter, Rick Green. Thursday, Sept. 23, 9-10:30 am. Hartford Courant Columnist Rick Green has been following both the abuses of the Connecticut Probate Courts and the various proposals to reform these courts that play such an important role in our society and particularly affect the elderly. He will bring us up to date on developments and answer your questions.

FSS-3. THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR: ITS MARITIME HISTORY

Louis Norton, Presenter. Thursday, Sept. 23, 10:45 am-12:15 pm.

The presenter, a retired professor of dentistry from the UConn Health Center and author of several books and articles on maritime history, will discuss aspects of the Revolutionary War from the standpoint of the continental navy.

FSS4. HAITI

Leslie G. Desmangles, Ph.D., Presenter. Thursday, Sept. 23, 1:15-2:45 pm.

Professor Desmangles, a Haitian-born anthropologist teaching at Trinity College who has relatives in Haiti and has been closely following developments there since the earthquake, will speak about the history of Haiti, the latest developments there, and its prospects for the future.

FSS-5. TOUR, DINOSAUR STATE PARK

Joe Panitch, Coordinator. Thursday, Sept. 30, 11 am.-1pm. Dinosaur State Park features 600 early Jurassic dinosaur footprints on display, along with exhibits, a bookstore and Discovery Room. Visitors can watch a Park film, hear a track talk, walk the Park's trails, have a picnic (no food allowed inside the museum), and shop in the bookstore. Connecticut residents 65 and over can get a Charter Oak Pass which entitles them to free admission at Dinosaur and other state parks. Bring a picture ID to verify that you meet the age and residency requirements. Admission is \$10 for non pass holders.

FSS-6 THE HUTTERITES: A STUDY IN CULTURAL SURVIVAL

Prof. Michael Park, Presenter. Thursday, Oct. 14, 10 amnoon.

The presenter, who heads the Anthropology Department at Central Connecticut State University, will discuss the Hutterites, who have successfully dealt with 480 years of hardship and still thrive as a people and maintain their way of life, and suggests ways in which they may have managed this; he will also discuss their population dynamics and what they tell us about processes of microevolution in humans.

FSS-7. TOUR, THE HARTFORD COURANT

The presenter turns sheet metal into representational and abstract sculptures, including anticlassic shapes. He has studied with masters of pewter Frances Felton and Heikki Seppa, and his sculptures are in silver, pewter, and some jewelry in gold.


