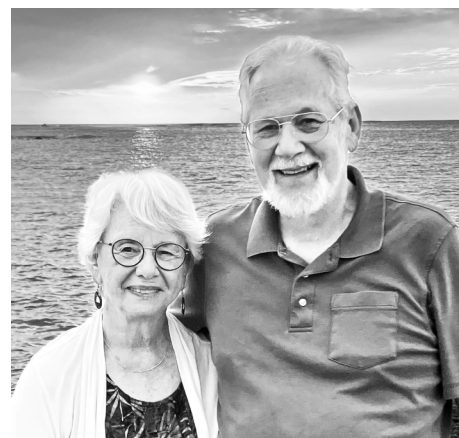
Beth Horlitz

FS-04 Hikes

Presenter: Kevin Gough & Paula Jones, Traprock Ridge Land Conservancy

When: Fridays 10/23, 11/6, 11/20 - 9:30am-12:00pm

We will visit hiking trails within a 20-mile radius of Bloomfield which have been recommended for their natural beauty, historical significance, flora and fauna, or other unique characteristics. Reflection offers vast reprieve for much that causes us to grieve.

FS-06 Beyond the Silk Road: Geography of the Crossroads of Eurasia

FSS-01 CT Foodshare's Produce Trucks

Presenter: Dom Piccini, Director of CT Foodshare's Agricultural Program

Dom Piccini leads CT Foodshare's Agricultural Program, using Freight Farms hydroponic trailers to grow fresh produce and expand access to nutritious food for food-insecure communities across Connecticut through innovative mobile farming and local partnerships.

FSS-02 Democracy Today: Challenges and Possibilities

Presenter: Miles Rapoport, Former Secretary of the State and Director of 100% Democracy

Democracy in the United States seems powerfully challenged right now. There are claims that the elections are rigged, and there are worries about potential interference in the elections coming up for the midterms. Where does all of this stand, and what can we look for? At the same time, we have longer terms, structural challenges that distort our elections and make people wonder if participation matters; the outsize role of money in politics, gerrymandering and redistricting, low levels of voting participation, misinformation and AI's power. Are there ideas on how to fix these flaws? And can we hope to succeed? These issues, both immediate and long term, will be the topic of this important discussion.

FSS-03 Prisoner Rights

Presenter: Stephen Pevar, Professor at Yale Law School

The U.S. Supreme Court has recognized that persons convicted of crime and sent to prison nevertheless retain certain constitutional rights in prison. These include the right to adequate food, clothing, and shelter. Stephen Pevar, during his 45 years on the National Staff of the ACLU, filed more than 50 "conditions of confinement" cases in federal court on behalf of prisoners seeking to protect these rights. Mr. Pevar will discuss the rights that prisoners retain, using his cases as examples.

Edith Wharton wrote her 1920 Pulitzer Prize winning novel in a gentler, less satirical mode than previous works. In her mid-fifties following the end of the war, the deaths of close friends, the lingering aftermath of a passionate affair, she experienced a degree of nostalgia for the old New York of her childhood but also a degree of hope in the brash, less cultivated younger generation. We will look at the novel in the context of Wharton's life and art, her ongoing critique of American society, and her portrayal of men and women seeking to lead meaningful if limited lives.

FSS-05 The Triumphs and Tragedies of Mount Everest

There are many reasons why people decide to tackle the monumental challenge of climbing the world's tallest mountain, Mount Everest. The highest point on Earth. We will take a look at some of the tragedies that have befallen climbers over the years as well as some of the inspirational accomplishments.

FSS-06 King Philip's War (1675-76) in the Connecticut River Valley

Presenter: Sarah Sportman, PhD, CT State Archeologist

King Philip's War (1675-76) deeply affected communities along the Connecticut River Valley. This presentation explores the conflict with a focus on the Hollister Site, a large 17th-century farm complex in present-day South Glastonbury, Connecticut, believed to have been raided during the war. Located at the edge of early English settlement, the site offers a rich documentary record revealing the political, military, and trade activities of its residents. Through this lens, we gain insight into life on a colonial frontier shaped by conflict, uncertainty, and cultural interaction.

FSS-07 "Chronic Diarrhea" and Travelogue: China--"Off the Beaten Track"

FSS-08 The Construction of Upper Body Prostheses

Presenter: Robert Rieger, Retired Corporate Executive in the Chemical and Electronics Industries

When: Monday 10/26 - 1:00pm–3:00pm

Join us for an inspiring look at how technology and compassion come together to change lives. This course introduces e-NABLE, a global network of volunteers who design and 3D print prosthetic hands and arms for people in need, especially in underserved countries. The presenter, a retired corporate executive with a background in engineering and electronics, will share his personal journey into 3D printing after retirement. Over four years, he has created and donated 34 devices to children and adults. Come and see how one person's skills can make a remarkable difference.

FSS-09 CT Beaver Dams and AI

Presenter: Evan Zocco, PhD Student, UConn Department of Natural Resources and the Environment

When: Tuesday 10/27 - 10:00am–12:00pm

Evan Zocco's research uses drone imagery, remote sensing, aerial imaging, and deep learning to monitor changes in wetlands and floodplains. He is particularly interested in how beavers influence hydrology, vegetation, and ecosystem dynamics across landscapes. His work develops computer-based mapping methods that help identify and track environmental change over time.

FSS-10 Astrophotography

Presenter: Jeffry Mitton, Professor Emeritus, University of Colorado

When: Thursday 10/29 - 1:00pm–3:00pm

Professor Mitton's "dedicated astro-camera" explores an incomprehensible vastness. Its pinpoint tracking of light depicts events such as the remnants of a supernova explosion named "Jellyfish" which is 5,000 light years away and 70 light years across. Jeff's photography has captured the "Ghost of Cassiopeia," and the Whirlpool Galaxy, 31 million light years away and canvassed among the 100 billion stars of the Milky Way. Jeff will describe his equipment and the planning that precedes a photographic outing.

FSS-11 Everyday Decisions: A Peek into the World of Probability and Statistics

Presenter: Jonathon Dixon, MD

Probability and statistics should not be thought of as boring or abstruse branches of mathematics. On the contrary, they can be useful as simple aids to rational, everyday decision making. This session will review some very basic but easily understood concepts utilizing real-life examples and probability puzzles. Audience participation, while totally voluntary, will be encouraged. You might think you are a math dummy, but you will still have fun. Absolutely no math experience is required, just some curiosity. You might also gain a new perspective on intuition.

FSS-12 Anatomy of a Federal Murder Trial

Presenter: Robert (Bob) Frost Jr., Attorney

Based on an actual Connecticut federal murder case that ended in a mistrial and eventual dismissal, this presentation offers a first-hand look at the challenges and courtroom dynamics of defending a person accused of a serious crime. Participants will gain insight into the federal criminal justice system and the role of defense counsel.

FSS-13 Making Your Voice Heard in Dark Times

Presenter: Christine Palm, Director, The Active Voice; and former state legislator

When: Friday 12/4 - 10:00am-12:00pm

Where: Seabury Chapel

"Making Your Voice Heard in Dark Times: A Citizen's Guide to the Untapped Power of State Government" explains, through concrete examples, how "ordinary" citizens can have a powerful role in protecting our democracy. As the federal government goes further into authoritarian practice, state governments -- especially here in Connecticut -- have enormous power (thanks to the Tenth Amendment) to protect their citizens. Participants will learn how they can play a critical role in this.
